East Knox Local School District From the Superintendent

Dear Parents, Students and Community Members,

There are moments when I sit down to write these articles that I am not sure where to begin an attempt to coherently discuss everything happening on our campus at a particular moment in time!

As we continue to deal with the ramifications of the pandemic, a side note is that our cases of flu are drastically reduced so far this school year. It has been quite common that we limped into Christmas break each year wondering if we would have to close school because of absentee rates approaching twenty percent. That was certainly not the case this year. In its place, of course, is Covid-19. Although our school numbers of positive cases are low, the pandemic continues to drastically change families' lives including amongst our own staff with the loss of loved ones and friends. There are unfortunately few who don't know someone affected. Nevertheless, I am confident that we will prevail as we continually adjust to new realities at home, work and out and about in general daily life.

Change continues on our campus too for very good reasons as 2021 arrives. Grades 7-12 students attended classes for the last time in the old sections of the Junior/Senior High School on December 17th. Teachers sorted through decades' worth of materials and packed for the move to modular classrooms where those students will attend for the next three semesters during our construction project. Maintenance and custodial staff worked through their holidays moving things to storage and assisting in getting classroom furnishings moved to the modular buildings. I assure you that it has been a herculean effort especially as the modular company was a month behind schedule in having those buildings ready for our use.

Due to the above delay, Grades 7-12 students are in remote learning mode until January 19th while Grades K-6 attend in-person instruction on campus each school day. Fortunately, the rest of the project moves full speed ahead without delay. We should see actual demolition begin before the end of this month. The project will be finished Summer, 2022 with students attending classes in the new section beginning September 6, 2022.

As our campus enters a transitional phase, I offered tours of the Junior/Senior High School over four days during the holidays so that folks could have the chance to walk the halls one last time and reminisce. The response was overwhelming. I cannot begin to express what a personal joy it was to meet so many of you and have the opportunity to learn much about your school experiences within those hallowed halls. It was fascinating to hear the stories and the number of times it was said, "If these walls could talk." There were a couple folks who thought it probably best that the walls could not repeat some of the orneriness of their exploits. Thanks to each of you for the time I got to spend with you. It was truly an honor!

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
Groundbreaking—12/17/20

The East Knox School Board and Administration welcomed students, staff and community members to our Groundbreaking Ceremony on December 17, 2020. Although the weather delayed us for an hour, we were ultimately undeterred in formally recognizing the moment of the official start of our construction project for new academic spaces. We enjoyed listening to our Marching Band, directed by Mr. Elijah Henkel, play several tunes and lead us in the Star Spangled Banner. Other attendees included members from Fanning/Howey Architecture and Elford Construction.

1939 Hidden History—Found



East Knox Schools' Maintenance staff began preparations for demolition of the old school sections as soon as the fall semester concluded. They discovered on December 18th a hidden treasure behind the 1939 building dedication plaque as it was removed. Upon removal, they found that a small nook had been chiseled out of the plaster and a 1939 yearbook placed in that spot hidden behind the plaque for the next 81 years. "The Bridge" yearbook contains the list of each class' students and the usual pictures one would expect to find. Another treasure within the book is a letter from the Howard Rural School District Board of Education to the community explaining the benefits of passing a bond issue to build the new school and the ramifications if it failed. Superintendent J.E. Nesbitt noted on the letter that the bond issue passed by 78%. Voters reaffirmed their faith in students and their futures through the years as evidenced through approval of building additions and other improvements to the 1939 building in 1948, 1955, 1956, 1974 and 1994. We look forward to what other treasures we will find in the coming months as we prepare for the start of the actual construction of new instructional space. We will be sure to follow our predecessors' lead and leave something for future generations to find many years from now including our own discovery of the 1939 vearbook!

To the Voters and Patrons of the Howard Rural School District.

On August 9th the voters of the Howard Rural School District will be given an opportunity to preserve the high school and to provide a modern fireproof school building for the high school and grade children by the approval of a bond issue in the sum of \$46,750.

Your support in conjunction with the Federal Grant of \$38,250 will make it possible to erect and equip an \$85,000 building amply sufficient to care for the children of the district without any additional bond issue.

Bear in mind this is the critical time, because, if this proposal is not approved, the \$38,250 grant will go to some other school district, and in time we will be obliged to vote a bond issue entirely upon the district or lose our schools. If the bond issue is defeated, the future of the Howard School District will be entirely in the hands of the State Department of Education, and the district finally will be partitioned by the State Department of Education among other school districts regardless of the wishes of our people.

Recently the Supreme Court of Ohio ruled that territory transferred to other districts must pay on the bonded indebtedness of those districts.

A favorable decision by the voters of the school district will enable the Howard Rural Schools to continue as a permanent school set up. The state and federal government are giving us an opportunity to maintain this set up.

We draw this conclusion from the following, which is an extract from the last inspection of our schools October 8, 1937 by F. M. Shelton, High School Supervisor:

"The future of the high school should be considered. If the district is to maintain an accredited high school, a new building of sufficient size to provide accommodations for the pupils should be constructed. On the whole the teaching is good; some of it is excellent The school is ably administered and directed.

For your information, in considering the life of the bonds being voted upon by Howard, Danville and Bladensburg this year, the tax-payers of Howard will pay 38% less than the tax-payers of Danville, and 16% less than the tax-payers of Bladensburg.

Our proposal will require a levy of 1.65 mills.

We urgently request your careful consideration of this matter, and, should you still be undecided as to your wish in the matter, any member of the Board of Education will be pleased to explain it to you as to costs, benefits and conveniences.
